"How do you do it all?" A first grader from St. Malachy School summed up the overwhelming scope of serving as mayor of the town of Geneseo with one simple and innocent question. Kathy Carroll-Duda, a long-time St. Malachy parishioner and current mayor of the city of Geneseo, revealed that she relies on God for wisdom, guidance and discernment in her role as the leader of the community.

St. Malachy School in Geneseo kicked off National Catholic Schools Week by hosting Mayor Duda as guest speaker and focusing on "Faith, Knowledge and Service in Our Community."
