Liturgy Leanings for November, 2020

November--Month of All Souls; The season of Ordinary Time concludes on November 22 with the feast of "Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe." The last Sunday of November, the 29th, is the First Sunday of Advent, the beginning of the Cycle B readings and a new liturgical year. The color for the Sundays of Ordinary Time is green, while violet is the color for the four Sundays of the season of Advent. The first week of Nov. is "National Vocation Awareness Week."

Saints whose memorials are observed during November:

11/1—(Sunday) All Saints' Day, a Holy Day of Obligation: May we be inspired to imitate the lives of those who are canonized saints, as well as those whom we have known who we believe are living forever in heaven with God

11/2—All Souls' Day: A commemoration of all the Faithful Departed; we especially think of those who have died since last All Souls' Day

11/3—Saint Malachy O'More, the patron saint of our parish; Bishop of Armagh, Ireland, 1129-1148; canonized in 1190 by Pope Clement III; also—Saint Martin de Porres: patron saint of racial justice, born in Lima, Peru, became a Dominican brother

11/4—Saint Charles Borromeo: as a Cardinal of the Church, he participated in the Council of Trent, supported clerical codes of conduct and seminary reform

11/9—Dedication of the Lateran Basilica in Rome in 324; this is the cathedral of the Bishop of Rome, the pope (NOT Saint Peter's!); the "mother church" of all churches in the world

11/11—Saint Martin of Tours: a Roman soldier who converted to Christianity, became the Bishop of Tours


11/13—Saint Frances Xavier Cabrini: Italian immigrant to New York; first U.S. citizen canonized, on July 7, 1846, by Pope Pius XII; National Shrine in Chicago

11/16—Saint Margaret of Scotland: Queen of Scotland, mother of eight children, dedicated to prayer, good works, restoring monasteries

11/17—Saint Elizabeth of Hungary: Queen of Hungary, special care for poor, feeding the hungry, and nursing the sick

11/18—Saint Rose Philippine Duchesne: came to Missouri to educate Native Americans and the poor of St. Louis; a member of the Society of the Sacred Heart, she and the sisters established orphanages and schools across this country; canonized July 3, 1988 by Pope John Paul II, Shrine in St. Charles, Mo

11/24—Saint Andrew Dung-Lac and Companions: Vietnamese priest and 117 companions who died practicing the Catholic faith in Vietnam between the 16th and 17th centuries









Dear St. Malachy Parishioners,

"Come to Me, all you who labor and are burdened..." (Jesus in Matthew 11:28, found in this weekend's Gospel Acclamation). We have been coming to Him daily this past week during our Novena (what a joy it has been to spend that time in prayer with so many of you!) with our prayers for our parish, our nation and our world. Now, as we prepare for the conclusion of the Novena and the celebration of the Feast Day this week, what better time to announce something new in the life of our parish. Since the very day of my arrival, I began being approached by a variety of parishioners who were interested in seeing certain aspects of the Daily Mass schedule revisited. Furthermore, certain aspects of the schedule did not seem preferable for me. This eventually led to the recent survey, primarily intended to obtain more information regarding what kind of schedule might be most helpful for parishioners. Thankfully, the results were fairly clearly indicative of majority preferences, with virtually no "close calls." When it comes to examining the results a little more thoroughly and reflectively to gain key insights, I admit that I am no statistician, but even for me, some basic observations seemed quite apparent. It did seem clear that there are a significant number of people in our parish who would be at least somewhat (in some cases very) likely to attend daily Mass if the times were more compatible with their work schedule or other responsibilities. It also seemed fairly clear that, for those who are unable to attend an 8 AM Mass due to work or other responsibilities, an evening Mass is the more effective way to enable the majority of them to attend daily Mass, rather than an earlier morning Mass. Furthermore, the overwhelming majority who preferred the 8 AM Mass to the earlier 7 AM option did not make it seem worth serious consideration to keep any earlier Masses on the schedule. I am very happy to incorporate a weekly evening Mass into our Daily Mass Schedule. This will take place on Thursday evenings at 5:45, and be preceded by a Holy Hour of Eucharistic Adoration at 4:30, during which a rosary will be led and Reconciliation will become available at 5 PM. This is a beautiful way to celebrate the gift of the Eucharist in a deeper way every Thursday, on which day we recall the day on which this Source and Summit of our Faith had its birth (Holy Thursday). You will also notice a couple of other additions to the schedule, namely additional times for Reconciliation. Finally, the other key change you will notice is that I have moved my day off from Monday to Friday, which means the return of Monday Mass and the addition of a special First Friday Mass, followed by devotions - the remaining Fridays, one of our deacons will offer a Communion Service.

Thus, the Daily Mass schedule, which will begin this week (November 2nd) will be as follows:

New Daily Mass Schedule

Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday 8 AM Mass

Wednesday 9 AM School Mass or Prayer Service (For School only) Monday & Tuesday 8:45 AM Reconciliation as well as Saturday 3:30 - 4:30 PM Thursday 4:30 PM Holy Hour of Eucharistic Adoration

5 PM Reconciliation while rosary is being recited in the church 5:45 PM Mass

Friday 8 AM Communion Service (Except First Fridays) First Friday 8 AM Mass (in place of Communion Service)

8:30 Holy Half-Hour of Eucharistic Adoration with Divine Mercy Chaplet First Saturday 8 AM Mass

8:30 Holy Half-Hour of Eucharistic Adoration with Rosary Mondays. 3-8 PM Eucharistic Adoration

Holy Days: When additional Masses need to be added to accommodate a Holy Day, we will remain consistent with the regular Daily Mass schedule, in that any additional Morning Masses will be at 8 AM & evening Masses will be 5:45 PM.

Civic Holidays: Certain civic holidays (such as Thanksgiving) will result in the Daily Mass being rescheduled to 9 AM.

All Souls Day November 2nd (All Souls Day) will mark the return of the Monday morning Mass. I want to extend a special invitation to this Mass to all who have lost loved ones in the past year, especially in this pandemic year that has tragically prevented so many from having a proper funeral. All Souls Day is a special, beautiful and unique moment in which the whole Church is called to unite in prayer for all of our brethren who have been lost, marking the beginning of the whole month of November, which is also focused on the same purpose. Toward this end, please remember also the invitation of the Liturgy Committee to commemorate a loved one. Let us keep this

in our thoughts and prayer, that it may be a time of true healing for many souls who are grieving the loss of loved ones.
