



September Liturgy Leanings

Our faith must be accompanied by works of compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience; these attributes are the characteristics of those who follow Christ's teaching. We are called to engage with our families and communities in light of His teaching and in imitation of Him. We believe that Jesus Christ is the Son of God, but does our faith have an impact on how we live in the world?

Feast Days in September:

9/3 - St Gregory the Great - He led the church through plagues and invasions, using his talent for organization and leadership in service of both political peace and spreading of Christianity.

9/8 - Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary - The first of many holy events for the daughter of Israel through whom God chose to carry out the plan of salvation through Mary.

9/14 - Exaltation of the Holy Cross - The universal symbol of Christian faith, the cross represents Christ's victory over death.

9/15 - Our Lady of Sorrows - Commemorates the seven great sorrows which Mary lived in relation to her son: 1) prophecy of Simeon, 2) flight into Egypt, 3) loss of Jesus in the Temple, 4) meeting Jesus on Via Dolorosa, 5) crucifixion of Jesus, 6) taken down from Cross, and 7) burial of Jesus.

9/21 - St Matthew Apostle/Evangelist - Author of 1st gospel and presented evidence reconciling the Old Testament prophecies with the life of Jesus showing that Jesus was the Messiah.

9/27 - St Vincent De Paul - Recognized for his charity and compassion for the poor. He established a society of priests dedicated to preaching to peasants and providing for the physical needs of the poor.

8/29 - Feast of Sts. Michael, Gabriel, Raphael the Archangels - These are only angels named in scripture and have held special roles in salvation history as agents of God who minister to human beings.

A Note From the Pastor

Last weekend, as I acknowledged in the homily, there was one rather significant topic that I did not discuss in the interest of time, namely that of a proper interpretation of Ephesians 5. Particularly in light of some interactions I had with parishioners afterward, I decided to address it in this next bulletin. In order to refresh your memory, this is the teaching in which Saint Paul applies his moral exhortations specifically to husbands and wives, including a line which is often ripped out of context and seriously misunderstood, in which he exhorts wives to be "subordinate" to their husbands in everything. First, let me say, I understood why this passage makes people (particularly women) uncomfortable and even upset. Next, let me reassure you that Saint Paul is NOT saying what it sounds like, when we read it at surface level, often out of context and also often with our 21st Century lens. I want to address a few points here, which might help. I ask all reading this to do so with an open mind and a patient spirit of faith seeking understanding. Let's see if we can make some progress toward a better understanding in five basic steps:

1. "Be subordinate to one another." Notice he only gives the startling exhortation that wives must "be subordinate," AFTER he said clearly that they BOTH must be subordinate to one another. He is not asking anything of the wives that he does not ask of the husbands. We should begin, then, by realizing that a right interpretation of Paul acknowledges both equality and complementarity. The husband and wife are equal in dignity, value and importance; thus, they begin on the same footing, both called to be subordinate to the other. But, their roles are complementarity. This concept is stamped into our nature. Men and women are equal in dignity; one is not better than the other. But, they are not the same, but complementary to one another.

2. Paul speaks to the wives first. The importance of this simple detail is difficult for us to appreciate within our 21st Century lens. In fact, it wasn't until I heard this pointed out by a female scripture scholar, that I became aware. But, to the women reading it, they would have recognized that he was honoring them by this very deliberate choice. And some of the men would likely have had their feathers ruffled. Not only does he speak to the wives first, he speaks to them directly as free agents who have a choice. He does not tell the men, "your wives need to listen to you." He speaks to the women directly, because it is their free choice and they are not to be forced or coerced. Both have already been told to be subordinate to one another. Next, he speaks to the women directly and urges them to do their part in living this out. Admittedly, since there is a complementarity to their roles, the way they live this out does not look identical (the next point elaborates on this difference a little more). And so, the fact that he addresses them directly and asks them to make this choice indicates that he understands he is asking them to make a sacrifice.

3. Behind every great man, there is a great woman. You've heard the saying. It's very true. Such women are humble - not quiet, submissive and weak, but with the kind of humility that makes one strong and bold. What does this have to do with Ephesians 5? The shocking part to our postmodern sensibilities is that it is clear that the complementary roles of husband and wife include a unique call for the men to lead and for the women to allow themselves to be led. The fifth point will elaborate on how this is more by way of emphasis, not meant to indicate that the woman only allows herself to be led; she leads in powerful ways as well. But, it is important and should not be avoided or ignored that Saint Paul is calling men - and we should add that GOD IS CALLING MEN, through Saint Paul - to be true spiritual leaders in the family! Men easily find themselves caught up in worldly things (even when they know they are providing for their family), such that the temptation is very common to pass off the MOST IMPORTANT things, like raising the children and specifically raising them in the faith, to the wife, viewing it as "women's work." Children need their fathers. They need their fathers to be active, attentive and present in their life and they especially need them to be models for them of what it looks like to live the faith. Studies continue to show the incredible effect that the engagement of fathers in their faith has on whether or not their children will grow up to live the faith. Men, your family needs you and they need you to be men of faith, who lead them to heaven. It will become even more clear in the next point that Saint Paul is calling married men to step up! In order for this to happen, they need the support of their wives. They need their wives to not let them off the hook and simply take over the leadership of the family.

This doesn't mean, for example, that mothers don't lead their children and form them in the faith, and perhaps even more so if the father is absent or is unengaged in the faith. No, mothers do lead children to faith in very powerful ways too. But, as we strive for God's plan, we begin to see how those same women expect their husbands to lead and allow them to do so, whenever they have the opportunity. And when they embrace this vision and seek to support their husbands in his mission, they can have incredible power to help him become the man he was made to be and the man his family needs. How do they do it? Good question. I don't know how they do it. But, I've seen the feminine genius at work in so many families, in which good women, who are truly both humble and strong, help their husbands become the best version of themselves.

4.**Paul puts the more shocking expectation on the men.** As I said, we cannot miss that Paul is truly calling the men to step up and be men of God who lead their families to heaven. The temptation to get hung up on those words about the wives being subordinate tragically often prevents many people from really noticing what he calls the men to do. He calls them to lay down their lives, to be crucified with Christ for their wives and thus also for their

families! Even before we get to this line, if we recognize that he is calling men to be leaders within marriage and the family, we should realize this can ONLY be rightly understood when considering the Christian view of leadership. Christian leaders are called to selfless, sacrificial service, never to lording it over those they are called to lead. This is the essence of leadership and so it is the essence of being a husband or father. Husbands, God is calling you, through Saint Paul, to *serve* your wives and family. In fact, he is calling you to stop at nothing, to give everything, so that your wife and family may taste the joys of eternal life. Your model is Jesus Christ crucified. This is what Saint Paul asks of the men. It is certainly not less than what he asks of the women.

5. We can't miss the rich theology of marriage that Paul is proposing. Lastly, let us not let those words to the wives that we easily misunderstand cause us to miss the bigger theological vision of marriage that Paul is proposing here. God made marriage a beautiful symbol used throughout salvation history of how much He loves us. Paul's words indicate that vision, reaching from Genesis, through Christ the Bridegroom laying down His life for His bride, all the way to the wedding feast of the Lamb in heaven. The reference to Genesis should give us a hint that, like Adam and Eve, the husband and wife are to be helpmates to one another, helping one another get to heaven. In this way, they truly do lead one another, but in different ways. All of that is why I suggest that the best way to understand Ephesians 5 is to understand more fully the depths and riches of God's vision for marriage, especially if you have been called to marriage. Thus, my specific recommendation for further study on FORMED is not a talk specifically on Ephesians 5, but any of the many teachings on marriage, sexuality and the family. You may find these under the subject grouping "marriage" or you may even take up the series Beloved, meant for preparation for matrimony, in the Sacraments section.

May Mary and Joseph continue to be our intercessors and guides. "Each year His parents went to Jerusalem for the feast of Passover..." (Luke 2:41). Saint Joseph, Most Faithful, pray for us!






New Altar Server Training
