A Note From the Pastor



Dear St. Malachy Parishioners,

"They set out at once and returned to Jerusalem where they found gathered together the eleven and those with them... Then the two recounted what had taken place on the way and how he was made known to

them in the breaking of the bread" (Luke 24:33,35). These words from the Easter story told in the Gospel of Luke have been our theme verse for this Year of Missionary Discipleship. The word "year" is a funny word. Scientific insight has led us to think of a year as one revolution of the earth around the sun, which takes approximately 365 days. We usually mark this by the calendar year that begins every January and ends at the end of every December. Yet, we use the word in many different ways. We speak of the calendar year, the fiscal year, and the school year. Within the church, we also use the word in a variety of ways. Primarily we speak of the Church Year, also known as the Liturgical Year (as it is marked by the days, weeks and seasons of the liturgical calendar). As you probably know, this Church Year begins every Advent and ends with the week of Christ the King, which we celebrate this weekend. So, Happy New Year!

And yet, the Pope, bishops and pastors can also declare a specific "year" to focus on a specific theme or aspect of the faith, which can begin or end at any time (although they generally correspond to approximately one year of time). For example, a few years ago, Pope Francis declared a Year of Saint Joseph, beginning on December 8. 2020 to December 8, 2021 (thus neither corresponding exactly with either the Church Year or the calendar year). More recently, the bishops of the United States declared a three-year Eucharistic Revival, beginning on the Feast of Corpus Christi (June 19) 2022 and ending on Pentecost 2025. Meanwhile, as your pastor, I declared the first year (from Corpus Christi 2022 to Corpus Christi 2023) to be the Year of Presence at Saint Malachy. And this second year, which began on Corpus Christi 2023 and will end on Corpus Christi 2024, is the Year of Missionary Discipleship.

The focus for this "year" can be found in the second part of the Saint Malachy Revival Prayer: Lord Jesus Christ, You have made Yourself PRESENT to us in every age, through the Holy Eucharist. Help us to make You more widely KNOWN, that You may be greatly LOVED. Amen. It is also guided by the theme verse, from Luke, which began this letter. This beautiful Easter story tells of two disciples who were on the road to Emmaus, when the Risen Christ came to them and explained to them how all of the Scriptures pointed toward His life, death and resurrection. And yet, they did not recognize Him until the breaking of the bread, which led them to turn around, change directions and go back to Jerusalem to share this good news with the Apostles and those with them. This points to two important realities, which should remain in our hearts and minds this year. First, an encounter with Jesus Christ leads to the impulse to share His Good News with others. It is not meant to be kept to oneself, because His disciples are also given a missionary call. Second, as verse 35 tells us, part of that good news that is meant to be shared includes "how He was made known to them in the breaking of the bread." This is how it begins: He makes Himself known to us in the breaking of the bread, in the Holy Eucharist.

This end of the Church Year and beginning of a new one next week serves as a midway point in the Year of Missionary Discipleship. In this second half of the year, I want to focus a bit more on *how He makes Himself known to us in the breaking of the bread*. Next week, I will talk a little bit more about what that will look like in Advent. For now, let us ask Our Lady to help us to keep our hearts open to how the Lord wishes to make Himself known to us, since she's an expert at it. For this, I will close with a part of a prayer taught to me, while I was studying at Immaculate Heart of Mary Seminary: "*Help me, O Maria, in each day to make your heart more known. Amen.*"



St Malachy Memories

In honor of St Malachy School celebrating its centennial year, the hunt was on to find someone with recollections of their early school years. Virginia Vandemore Wachtel is one of the earliest students located. Following are some memories she shared in a memoir to her family.

When I was growing up there was no kindergarten, so I started school in 1934 at 6 years old. I went to St Malachy School. I don't remember how many were in my class, but I think 8 or 10. The Dominican nuns were the teachers, and they had their hands full as none of us knew our colors, numbers, and letters like kids today. First, second, and third grade were in the east room on the first floor and fourth, fifth, and sixth were across the hall. Seventh and eight were upstairs. There was one empty room at that time that was used for storage. The population of Geneseo at the time was only 2,500 - 3,000 so there weren't too many kids. Of course, there was no tuition or anything like that.

It has always been that the nuns favored the boys- or at least it seemed that way to the girls! There was a baseball diamond that the boys could play on, and the girls played in front of the school. We played jacks, hopscotch, jump rope and things like that.

In those days the boys wore knickers to school, but as time went on they switched to corduroys- no jeans; sometimes, the "country boys" would wear overalls. Ugh! The girls did not wear slacks. They were unheard of. We wore long tan cotton stockings and garters that looked like rubber bands! If it was really cold our mothers would make us wear long underwear! By the way, we had to wear long stockings to school <u>every day</u>- even when it was hot!

When Father Casey was pastor, I was about 5th grade. He came to the school every morning and checked to see if we had gone to Mass that morning. I always did because I sang in the choir. If you hadn't gone to Mass, you wished you had!! He was a good priest, very outgoing, and really did like the school and all the kids. (During the time he was here there were hard feelings between the Catholics and the public-school kids, so Father would have dances for the high school kids from both schools and they really went over great. I was too young to go but heard great things about it. He really helped get good feelings between all.

When I was about 6th grade, I wanted to have a mirror in the girl's bathroom. Well of

course that was "vanity". The nuns would not hear of it. My dad had a job as manager of a grocery store where Guzzardos used to be, so he got me an orange box, they were made of wood, and I took that to school and a mirror. Well, I was in trouble, but the "vanity" and mirror stayed.

We always kneeled down to say prayers morning, noon, and after school. Well, most of the kids were poor and only had one pair of shoes. I remember my shoes had a hole in the sole, and I was so embarrassed to kneel down. At that time, you could buy "half soles" that you could put on the bottom of your shoes. Well, they didn't stick very well. Finally, I did get another pair of shoes. It seemed forever though!

I think we got a good education from the nuns. The St. Malachy kids always did well in high school. When I graduated there were 6 in my class. We all went to high school, and it seemed so big. As a credit to the nuns, most of us were on the honor roll most of the time!

There were no school busses in those days. You walked to school or the country kids' (there weren't many of them) parents brought them. When I was in the 8th grade, we had confirmation and graduation within two weeks. It was a very exciting time.

During May we had May crowning of the Blessed Mother. It was an honor to be the one to crown Mary's statue. You got to wear a long white dress and a long veil. The children of the school would have a procession the church. It was nearly like a wedding. Well, I was chosen to be May Queen. I was thrilled at that. I borrowed a dress; I don't remember where the veil came from. I still love all the songs we sang for those things.

The whole school would have processions on Holy Thursday and any other time the Sisters could think up.

I sang in the choir from the time I was in 4th grade. This was <u>every</u> day. The girls sang in the choir and the boys had to take turns serving Mass. In the winter when it was cold and in the hot summer, we held Mass in the sister's chapel. Most of the songs were in Latin. I always get choked up when I hear a Latin song now. It brings back so many memories.

My husband Jamie and I both went to St. Malachy School as did our 4 brothers and 3 sisters, our 5 sons, many nieces and nephews, and grandchildren.

Advent: The Church's New Year

Happy New Year! Wait...what? It's not January 1 you might say. However, with the start of Advent, the Catholic Church begins a new liturgical year.

Advent is one of two seasons in the Church where it is a time of waiting, preparation, and penance. Lent is the other season.

During the four weeks of Advent, we eagerly anticipate and prepare for the birth of Jesus.

The season of Advent is joyous and hopeful as we light candles, finding warmth in the cold, dark winter days.

There are many traditions that we have during Advent including, but not limited to, the Advent wreath.

The first Sunday of Advent we light the first purple candle on the wreath, which represents *hope*. We hope in anticipation of the birth of Christ but also celebrate the beginning of a new liturgical season.



Purple, the primary color of Advent, symbolizes royalty, the royalty of the king who will soon come.

The second Sunday of Advent we light the second purple candle,

representing *peace*. This candle reminds us of Mary and Joseph's journey from Nazareth to Bethlehem before Mary gave birth to Jesus.

The third Sunday of Advent we light the pink candle, symbolizing *joy*. It is also called "Gaudete Sunday" meaning rejoice or praise. As we continue to approach Christmas, our joy grows more and more in anticipation just like the shepherds who journeyed to see Jesus in Bethlehem even before the wise men.

The last Sunday of Advent we light the final purple candle representing *love*, the ultimate love of God that He might send His only Son for us.

Often times we also see an Advent wreath with a white candle in the center. This candle reminds us that Jesus is the spotless lamb of God, sent to wash away our sins. His birth was for his death and his death was for our birth.

As we enter this new year, and the season of Advent, may we do so with hope, peace, joy, and love for all that awaits us in the birth of the Jesus Christ, Our King.
