



A Note From the Pastor ...

Dear St. Malachy Parishioners,

As our readings in Mass begin to focus on hearing and answering the Lord's call, let us consider the model set for us in this regard by our patron for this year: Saint Joseph. "When Joseph awoke, he did as the angel of the Lord had commanded him..." As we begin Ordinary Time in this Year of Saint Joseph... life might not seem that ordinary. In fact, we might find ourselves envying Good Saint Joseph for having had the clarity of knowing clearly what the Lord was asking of him. It's not always that simple. And life has a way of posing challenges to us in which we might be left with a great deal of uncertainty as to how we are to respond. This is certainly true today. We should remember that the same man greeted in his litany with the title "Joseph Most Obedient" is also called "Joseph Most Prudent." Prudence is marked by careful, reasonable discernment of the right action for the given moment and situation. How do we exercise it? The first step is simple: stop and think. No wonder the Catechism refers to it as "the charioteer of the virtues." which drives the rest! We will not enter into this discernment on our own. Even the Cardinal Virtues, of which this is the first, which are habits formed by human discipline, cannot be viewed apart from the assistance and guidance of the Lord. This human discipline, which begins with simply stopping and thinking before we act, is developed by exercising the gifts of intellect and free will, which are fundamental elements of the Image of God within us. Furthermore, while all of the virtues require human effort, their growth is supported by grace. In this sense, even the Cardinal (Human) Virtues begin and end with the Lord. But, they also require real effort on our part. In the face of the many challenging situations we find ourselves faced with, prudence would prompt us to be slow to speak, judge and act, before carefully discerning the truth within the given situation. Sometimes that takes time and even a bit of investigation and study, and may even require us to swallow our pride and admit that our initial view may be wrong or at least incomplete, because so many of these situations are not as simple as we often make them out to be and we sometimes need to own up to the human tendency to be quick to believe what we want to believe.

One situation to which this applies is the controversy surrounding the presidential election, which tragically recently erupted into violence in our nation's capital. Over the course of this past year, we have heard a great deal of over-simplifications of the complicated situations we have found ourselves facing, coming from various perspectives, including "both sides of the political spectrum" (as it is often termed). There is not one "side" that is more guilty than the other of this problematic oversimplification of the complicated realities in which we are living. And now it is sadly the case that, within the past year, we have seen reckless violence from "both sides of the political spectrum," endangering innocent lives and threatening the rule of law. As Catholics, we are called to the promotion of peaceful, reasonable and respectful dialogue, ordered toward the promotion of truth, justice, and the common good.


Another important matter of our time that is commonly being oversimplified is the question of the morality of the vaccines. On one hand, there are those who conclude that the ONLY moral response to them is to reject them, due to the unfortunately morally problematic process that is often involved in their production, development and testing. On the other hand, we have others who conclude that there is no reason to be concerned about any vaccines. Both of these views are an over-simplification of a much more complicated matter and neither represents the appropriate Catholic response. Next week, I will offer a more detailed explanation of the reasons why so many strongly pro-life Catholic leaders are reaching the conclusion that the use of some of the COVID19 vaccines (specifically those developed by Moderna and Pfizer) is morally permissible. I do not take lightly that these questions are legitimate and important and I want to address it when I have more space to do


so more thoroughly. Until then, may Saint Joseph intercede for all of us, that we may exercise greater prudence in how we strive to live in accord with the truth in all situations.
