

The Stations of the Cross are a 14-step Catholic devotion that commemorates Jesus Christ's last day on Earth as a man. The 14 devotions, or stations, focus on specific events of His last day, beginning with His condemnation. The stations are commonly used as a mini pilgrimage as the individual moves from station to station. At each station, the individual recalls and meditates on a specific event from Christ's last day. Specific prayers are recited, then the individual moves to the next station until all 14 are complete. Stations of the Cross are prayed on Fridays during Lent 12:00 noon and 7:00 pm.

Dear St. Malachy Parishioners,



"The child's father and mother were amazed at what was said about Him..." (Luke 2:33). St. Joseph, Lover of Poverty, pray for us. In this last weekend in February, recall the context of this month's theme verse: The Presentation of Our Lord in the Temple. Another little detail of this story tells us they offered a pair of two turtledoves (and it wasn't even the second day of Christmas!) or two young pigeons. If we were to open to Leviticus for the specifics of this ritual, we would learn that the option of the two turtledoves or pigeons was the option for the poor who could not afford a lamb. With this little detail, Saint Luke is subtly reminding us that Our Lord was born into a poor family. Even though the primary focus of choosing "Lover of Poverty" as the title in focus for this month was primarily a reference to poverty of spirit, still Saint Joseph identified with material poverty as well. Have you ever encountered someone living in such poverty and noticed that they have an incredible trust in God to provide for them what they need and also a corresponding gratitude for what they have? In his poverty, Saint Joseph learned to trust in the Lord. When we enter into the desert with him, through our Lenten discipline, we are invited to learn this incredible trust that would have sustained Joseph and Mary and fortified their hearts, as they stole away in the night to trade their humble, temporary dwelling for a life as exiles in Egypt. Part of the beauty of our Lenten desert experience is that we are invited to truly hunger with Christ and thirst with Him. We are invited to learn to rely upon the Lord and to long for Him, never taking Him for granted.

Last week, I began focusing on a different one of the Lenten disciplines (Prayer, Fasting, and Almsgiving) each week. As we focus on fasting, let us recognize how awesome is this call to fast, which may have seemed a bit like another "motion" to go through at another point in life. As someone who has learned to anticipate h'anger (hungry-anger) and factor it into my planning for Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, I understood well that most of us don't necessarily look forward to fasting, thanks to our fallen human condition and its weakness. And I admit that I have caught myself spending time on these fasting days daydreaming about the meals of tomorrow. It's not exactly fun. Yet, the freedom that we allow to grow within us, when we let go and loosen our grip on the things that we allow to fill up our lives, is worth it all. Not to mention, it is a small token of gratitude for all that the Lord suffered for us. Today, we use the term 'fasting' to apply much more broadly to eating very, very little or even to various other sacrifices of things we choose to give up. These sacrifices seem so little compared to our Lord's forty days of actual and total fasting in the desert, which prepared Him for a mission that would culminate in His suffering upon the cross for our salvation. We know that we will never "outdo" Our Lord and to try would completely miss the point, which is not to attempt to match His suffering with our own, but rather to choose to make an offering of love and gratitude. When we feel that rumble in our stomachs (literally or figuratively) and we see that dessert or burger or beer or remote control or whatever it may be and hear that voice in our heads say, "Why not?," the only answer we need is to lift our hearts to the Lord and say, "Simply because I love You more, Lord." This is always the first and most important reason for any of our sacrifices: we wish to make an offering of love to the Lord.

When we recognize that these offerings also are good for us, that they help us grow in interior freedom by detaching from things that perhaps we have allowed to have some hold on us, this is not to be our primary motivation. Rather, this benefit that it has for us is an expression of *His* Love for *us*. Thus, when we make such an offering simply because we love the Lord and wish to express it (in a manner that we notice throughout our day and makes a difference in our lives) and then we notice that He is expressing His Love for us by allowing us to experience personal growth by this offering, it becomes beautiful shared experience of the love between us. It becomes an experience of intimacy.


This is the goal of the desert experience: intimacy with the Lord. The Holy Family experienced such intimacy in those years of exile, as they together relied upon their Heavenly Father. Saint Joseph, Lover of Poverty, please pray that our Lenten desert experience may lead us to deeper intimacy with Christ.

LITURGY LEANINGS MARCH 2021



For March, violet is on the altar for the first 3 Sundays, then red for the last, which is Palm Sunday.

<u>March 3rd-St. Katharine Drexel, Virgin</u> - founded the Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament, an order that built elementary and high schools for African and Native American populations across the US. and established St. Xavier Univ. to train teachers for those schools.

<u>March 4th-St.Casimir</u> - born a prince of Poland, he lived a life of chastity, simplicity, and good works until his early death in his mid twenties.

<u>March 7th-Third Sunday of Lent</u> - In this weeks scriptures, we learn all of Gods people are called to a life that is moral, upright, holy and caring of others. Also love, faithfulness, and gratitude toward God ought to be our motivation to obey the Ten Commandments.

<u>March 8th- St. John of God, Religious</u> - cared for those with mental illness and founded what is now known as The Brothers Hospitallers of St. John of God.

<u>March 9th-St. Frances of Rome, Religious</u> - although an arranged marriage initially prevented her from pursuing a call to a religious life, her zeal for good works attracted a community of like-minded women who became the Oblates of Mary and the desire for her was finally fulfilled when her husbands death freed her to become its religious superior.

<u>March 14th- 4th Sunday of Lent</u> - In this weeks scripture, we learn we are called to be children of Christ's light; we are redeemed in him and through his grace and not by our own accord.

<u>March 17th-St. Patrick, Bishop</u> - after escaping slavery in Ireland, this saint spent 22 years acquiring education and skills to return to Ireland as a missionary to God, converting thousands and building church's and monasteries across Ireland.

<u>March 18th-St. Cyril of Jerusalem</u> - Bishop and Doctor of the Church- his love for the church made him a natural preacher and teacher.

<u>March 19th-St. Joseph, Spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary</u> - Joseph was a just man, who observed and revered the law. When he found out Mary was pregnant, he responded to God in faith, grace and love. He embraced God's request, loving and caring for his family. It is not a genetic line, but we are the family of God through adoption in Christ.

<u>March 21st- 5th Sunday</u> - One of the insights of this weeks scriptures is checking boxes and not breaking rules isn't the point of Catholic life; we are called to submit our hearts and minds to the Father, in imitation of Jesus.

<u>March 23rd- St. Turibius of Mogrovejo, Bishop</u> - was a Spanish noble who became a missionary archbishop of Lima, whose responsibility was to bring Christ to the people of Peru.

<u>March 25th-The Annunciation of the Lord</u> - this day highlights the very human role in Jesus' birth and upbringing. We are reminded to keep looking for ways God is at work in our lives

<u>March 28th Palm Sunday of The Passion of the Lord</u> - the day begins with songs of triumph and quickly shifts into the Lords passion. As we enter into this holiest of weeks with Christ, may our participation in each solemn liturgy draw us into deeper union with him and one another.

<u>March 29th- Monday of Holy Week</u>-the servant of the Lord is gentle yet powerful. He is "the victory of justice" and "a light to the nations."

<u>March 30th-Tuesday of Holy Week-</u> The people of Israel were by no means a powerful faction or well- organized country, yet God chose them and used them, like a hidden weapon to be a "light to the nations" and the beginning of the salvation of the world.

<u>March 31st- Wednesday of Holy Week</u>- On this day, the disciples were "deeply distressed", but Jesus carried on, knowing Judas would betray him, he went on with his Last Supper.
