Safe Environment Training

St. Malachy Parish and School will offer Safe Environment Training on Thursday, June 1 in St. Malachy Hall. This is a Diocesan initiative implemented in 2001 for the purpose of educating adults 18 and over about the importance of protecting minors and recognizing dangerous or inappropriate behavior. It is available for any adult who is interested in attending.

Employees and volunteers involved with religious education (examples: St. Malachy School, CCD, Youth Ministry, Vacation Bible School, Trail Life, Children's Liturgy of the Word) are **required** to complete Safe Environment Training. More information about the training can also be found at cdop.org, the Catholic Diocese of Peoria website.

New Employees and Volunteers: Training will be from 5:30-6:30 p.m. The program includes a PowerPoint presentation, completing Diocesan and state forms such as a background check (CANTS) and fingerprinting. **Please bring your driver's license**.

Employee and Volunteer Annual Update: If you have already completed Safe Environment Training, you will need to attend and fill out forms as part of the annual update. You may stop in any time between 5:30-6:30 p.m. to complete the paperwork, which should take about 10-15 minutes. Please bring your driver's license.

Something Beautiful for God interprets her life through her conversations with Malcolm Muggeridge, the quintessential worldly skeptic who experienced a remarkable conversion to Christianity because of her exemplary influence. The Dance of Life by Henri Nouwen. This book could have been simply called, "The Best of Henri Nouwen." Thoroughly power packed, it presents the very best of the imitable Nouwen. He and Forrest Church are giants: universally appealing skilled writers who touch our souls are core. The Dance is an extremely well-organized collection of appetizers for most of his revered works. In The Dance life-changing insights are identified with subject line references titling the original book that provided the larger more in-depth treatment of the principle/idea/insight discussed. It addresses every spiritual principle and discipline in a creative, sobering, intimate, refreshing and simple manner

<u>The New Testament Documents: Are they Reliable?</u> By F. F. Bruce. This modern classic in the field of New Testament studies offers a compelling defense of biblical truth. One of evangelicalism's most trusted scholars, F. F. Bruce clearly presents the evidence for the historical trustworthiness of the Christian Scriptures.

Thrift Store Saints: Meeting Jesus 25¢ at a Time by Jane Knuth. Thrift Store Saints is a collection of true stories based on Jane Knuth's experiences serving the poor at a St. Vincent de Paul thrift store in the inner city of Kalamazoo, Michigan. At the outset of the book, Knuth is a reluctant new volunteer at the store, sharing that her middle-class, suburban, church-going background has not prepared her well for this kind of work. By the end of the book, Knuth has undergone a transformation of sorts, and neither she nor we can ever view the poor in the same way again.

Knuth's transformation is rooted in the prevailing message of Thrift Store Saints: When we serve the poor, they end up helping us as much as we help them. Throughout the book we are introduced to new "saints," as Knuth thoughtfully, at times humorously, describes how her encounters with the poorest people led her to the greatest riches of God's grace.

Thrift Store Saints makes clear that it doesn't require heroic Mother Teresa-types to make a difference with the poor, and it even more powerfully shows us that working with them is not gloomy, depressing work. Knuth's moving stories demonstrate the profound joy any of us can experience when we see serving the poor not as social work, but as a spiritual path that leads us to the heart of Jesus.

You Did It to Me by Michael Gaitley, MIC. What Fr. Michael Gaitley, MIC, has done in 33 Days to Morning Glory to promote true devotion to Mary, and what he has done in Consoling the Heart of Jesus to promote devotion to the Merciful and Sacred Heart of Jesus, he now does in 'You Did It to Me' to promote the works of mercy.

Fr. Michael Gaitley [MIC] has a genius for bringing together the spiritual and corporal works of mercy under the umbrella of 'The Five Scriptural Works of Mercy'

that Jesus will use to judge us at the end of the world, Matthew 25:31-46. He then enriches these Scriptural texts on mercy with the practical insights of St. Pope John Paul II, St. Faustina, and Pope Francis.

St. Malachy Social Justice Committee

Have you ever wondered about the Social Justice Committee at St. Malachy's and why we are always asking for money – or food – or soap – or underwear?



In a nutshell, here is your answer: The Social Justice Committee at St. Malachy's exists to help all of us follow our call to be the hands and feet of Jesus. And what that really means is that our committee exists to help you love your neighbor like Jesus does! Loving our neighbor is as essential to our Catholic Faith as going to Mass and receiving the sacraments, and our purpose is to help you do that! Scripture and Catholic Teachings have a lot to say about how to love our neighbors. Are you familiar with the Corporal and Spiritual works of mercy? Are you familiar with the Seven Themes of Catholic Social Teaching? Two of the Corporal works of mercy are "Shelter the Homeless" and "Visit the Prisoners". This is why we ask you to support the Humility of Mary Shelter in Davenport and to give to Aunt Mary's Storybook Project.

One of the Themes of Catholic Social Teaching is a "Preferential Option for and with People who are Poor". This is why we ask you to purchase Fair Trade Coffee and other Fair Trade items. In coming months, we will be sharing more information about how Fair Trade helps to lift people out of poverty.

We will be pretty quiet this summer. We do ask that you contribute to the Student Services Project in July. (More information may be found on the next page.) But we also ask that you remember WHY we do what we do. We (all of us, not just the Social Justice Committee) are called to be the hands and feet of Jesus.

Structured as a daily prayer guide for everyday use over six weeks, each day offers a thematic reflection, a guided meditation, an original prayer, a thoughtful question, and a related scripture quote. A built-in guide for small groups makes this the perfect resource for groups of all kinds as well as individuals.

<u>The Man Who Wrestled with God</u> by John Sanford. A retelling of four Old Testament stories from a psychological perspective to help contemporary readers become whole and conscious persons.

The Message of Ephesians by John Stott. Millions have caught Karl Marx's vision of a New Man and a New Society. "Paul presents a greater vision still," writes John Stott. In his letter to the Ephesians the apostle "sees the human predicament as something even deeper than the injustice of the economic structure and so propounds a yet more radical solution. He writes of nothing less than a 'new creation." John Stott expounds Paul's theme of uniting all things in Christ by uniting his church and breaking down all that separates us from God, one ethnic group from another, husband from wife, parent from child, master from slave. A book for all who want to build the church into the new society God has planned it to be.

The Five Love Languages by Gary Chapman. Unhappiness in marriage often has a simple root cause: we speak different love languages, believes Dr. Gary Chapman. While working as a marriage counselor for more than 30 years, he identified five love languages: Words of Affirmation, Quality Time, Receiving Gifts, Acts of Service, and Physical Touch. In a friendly, often humorous style, he unpacks each one. Some husbands or wives may crave focused attention; another needs regular praise. Gifts are highly important to one spouse, while another sees fixing a leaky faucet, ironing a shirt, or cooking a meal as filling their "love tank." Some partners might find physical touch makes them feel valued: holding hands, giving back rubs, and sexual contact. Chapman illustrates each love language with real-life examples from his counseling practice.

<u>The Life of St. Margaret Mary Alacoque</u> by Rev. Emile Bougaud. This is considered to be the best biography of The Saint of the Sacred Heart Devotion. The whole story of the revelations, plus the definitive story of her life. The author portrays St. Margaret Mary as a redoubtable soul, ready to give all for Jesus. And what an example she is! It is largely due to St. Margaret Mary that we know what we do about the Sacred Heart of Jesus.

WHAT'S NEW IN LIBRARY

(these books may be found on the "New Book" Shelf by the window)

<u>Coming Down the Mountain</u> by Thomas Hart. A unique follow-up guide for people who have recently completed a retreat, including a daily reflection on some aspect of Christian living, a scripture passage for prayer, and a suggestion for Christian action for a six-week period of time.

<u>The Psalms: Meditations for Every Day of the Year</u> by Sr. Joan Chittister. The psalms are the oldest prayers in the Judeo-Christian tradition. Joan Chittister sees them as a lexicon of the human condition, assuring us of God's caring presence and loving help in every situation. In this beautifully designed book, Chittister provides a favorite psalm for each month and a reflection on the prayer for each day.

Eternal Seasons: A Liturgical Journey with Henri J.M. Nouwen. The cycle of the liturgical year engages us with an entirely different rhythm than our usual frenzied pace. It invites us to live time in eternity, to discover a new understanding of God and creation. Henri Nouwen lived the liturgical year with sensitivity and imagination. The feasts and seasons inspired his sermons on the great mysteries of our faith. And praying the liturgical year gave him a glimpse of eternity in the present moment.

This valuable companion features a thoughtful introduction for each of the liturgical seasons, followed by a generous selection of brief, readable passages. Whether focusing on the tenor of the season, the many dimensions of a feast day or the import of a particular saint, these readings enable us to reflect and pray in closer harmony with the Church year.

<u>Open the Door: A Journey to the True Self</u> by Joyce Rupp. The long-awaited book from best-selling spiritual guide Joyce Rupp, creatively leads readers to explore how the image of the door can guide them in a process of discovering their true self.

Joyce Rupp brings new life to the ageless spiritual image of the door, weaving insights from East and West with the wisdom of contemporary spiritual writers, poets, and novelists in a practical format that is just right for contemporary readers.

You are already sweet enough! The average American consumes 25 teaspoons of sugar a day. With raising global rates of obesity and chronic diseases, the World Health Organization (WHO) has taken note. The World Health Organization's Guideline suggests a goal of limiting sugars to 5 percent of daily calories (~100 cals). This means watching out for all the hidden sugars added to processed foods and sweetened yogurts. The sugar tax is working in Mexico. People are kicking the can and drinking more water.

Skip the soda and sugary beverages!

More Sleep = Better Blood Sugars. Get 7 to 8 hours high quality sleep a night. There is growing evidence that lack of sleep is associated with increased levels of stress hormones and cytokines leading to insulin resistance. It is worth taking the steps needed to improve quality and duration of sleep. Consistent restful sleep improves insulin sensitivity, and may lower the risk of developing diabetes.

Dentists as Diabetes Detectives. Because periodontal disease is associated with diabetes, the benefit of chair-side screening and referral to primary care seems promising. The dental profession offers the real potential to improve earlier diagnosis of prediabetes and diabetes. It is estimated that 30% of patients 30 years of ages seen in general dental practices have elevated blood glucose levels.


