St. Malachy Parents Club usually sponsors t-shirt and sweatshirt sales every other year. While the apparel sales are not typically large money-makers for the school, the main goal is to showcase school pride. This year's sale, however, was a different story, and generated nearly \$2,000 profit for the school!

When Erin Wyffels' oldest son started Kindergarten at St. Malachy this year, she took the opportunity to get involved with the committee organizing the apparel sales. Inspired by her mother's many years in education, Erin was determined to show her appreciation for teachers once her own children began school. With the help of fellow school moms Jessi Haars and Devon Schaaf, they got to work. She graciously gifted sweatshirts to St. Malachy School staff.

Mrs. Wyffels offered both child and adult options, including t-shirts and hoodies. A total of 203 apparel items were sold, and counting!

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Half of the total sales were ordered online, an added convenience for families and friends eager to support St. Malachy School. Erin designed the apparel logo graphic, which artfully depicts our school's strong sense of faith and rich history.

Rural Route Life is the Wyffels' screen-printing business which they operate out of their home. Erin and her husband, Brian, began selling shirts just over a year ago. They are designed, printed, and shipped from their basement in Geneseo. They also have an online store, <u>www.ruralroutelife.com</u>, and their shirts are also sold in 2 retail stores so far: Katsch in Geneseo, IL and The MudbuM Supply Shack in Des Moines, IA. They have plans to expand the number of retail locations to 5 or 6 in 2019.

Because Erin is a busy mom of 3 little boys (Jase, Drew and Luke), there are many weeks when she has to limit the amount of hours dedicated to the business. We are very grateful for her time, talent and treasures. Wearing our heart on our sleeve, we say thank you to the Wyffels family!
